Update from the BCA



build on our 140-year legacy, we are excited about what the future holds. The bonds of brotherhood, commitment to growth, and dedication to serving our community have never been stronger.



Tom Rachal '79 on Working with Special Needs Families

Becoming a Fiji taught **Tom Rachal '79** the importance of trusted friends who would do anything to help you. Tom's hometown friends, **Kevin Snodgrass '78**, **Mark Hayes '78**, and **John Keith '75**, encouraged him to go through Rush, and from the moment he found Texas Fiji, he knew it was the right choice. “To this day, our pledge class is made up of great guys who truly care about the well-being of each brother and their families.”



Tom has been fortunate over the years to have a successful career. “However, my true blessings in life are my loving wife, Denise, and my son, Sam,” he said. “Sam has special needs, and his love for life and music has truly inspired many lives.”

Tom's family and Fraternity brothers consistently reaffirm his faith and his belief in the power of prayer. “Sam lives life to the fullest and instantly makes friends when he meets you. He sees life in a simpler way—a trait I wish I could adopt. No one can understand the brain of a child on the autism spectrum; all I know is that Sam has a caring and loving soul.”

Where Special Children Shine

To support kids like Sam (and their families), Tom has been the board chairman for Rays of Light, a Dallas-based nonprofit, since 2009. Rays of Light provides free respite care for families with special needs children, entertaining the kids and their siblings while the parents enjoy an evening to themselves. On Friday nights, the kids enjoy four hours of care featuring movies, a gym and computer room, puppet shows,

face painting, and the company of specially trained service dogs. They even host monthly birthday parties, ensuring every child gets a special celebration.

"Approximately 75 percent of our families are financially disadvantaged and cannot afford childcare—especially for a child with special needs," Tom explained. "In addition, many of our kids are raised by a single parent." The organization has two Dallas locations: Lovers Lane United Methodist Church and White Rock United Methodist Church. On any given Friday night, they can have up to 40 to 50 kids at either location. Rays of Light, since their beginning, has been committed to never charging their special families for respite care.

Tom attributes the nonprofit's success to the best staff and volunteers in the world. "I'm always amazed seeing kids coming through the door, watching their faces light up with excitement and pure joy," he said. "Special kids often do not get the attention they deserve; at Rays of Light, each child has one or two volunteers! The children are the center of attention, and they feel loved."

Lives of Service

In recent years, Tom's pledge class has started holding reunions, and he gets to see many brothers during football season as well. "Each time I see them, we quickly return to all the fun college memories. It blows my mind how much we still remember after all these years!" Tom is thankful not only for his brothers' friendship and company, but also for the support they have shown Rays of Life. Many donate to the organization and also attend its annual gala.

It was clear to me that within the walls of Buen Retiro, I would find not only lifelong friends but also a true home away from home.

This year, we've continued to make significant strides in philanthropy. So far, we've raised an impressive \$17,000 for Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, specifically TumorGlow, and we're on track to meet our goal of \$35,000 by year's end. Furthermore, we raised over \$15,000 for our annual Jake Ehlinger fundraiser (to honor the late **Jake Ehlinger '19**). We appreciate the support from the Ehlingers and everyone who made this event happen!

We've also committed over 250 hours thus far to organizations like the Neighborhood Longhorn Program, Central Foodbank, and UT Greek Day of Service. This level of support speaks volumes about the commitment of our brothers to giving back and making a difference in our community.

Academically, we've set the bar high. As a group, we've maintained a GPA of 3.49, demonstrating the strong dedication to excellence within our Chapter. Balancing academic rigor with the demands of campus

involvement is no easy task, but it's something Fiji has consistently excelled at.

One of the highlights of this year was recognizing the outstanding achievements of several brothers through our scholarship program.
